The holiday season is the time to spend with our loved ones, reflect on the year's activities and look towards the New Year. For AAC, this year has been a very busy year with lots of successes, challenges and excitements.

This year, AAC has been carrying out and continuing several exciting research projects, including:

- The "Cost-Consequences Analysis of IA Models of Care" project: a collaboration project between AAC, CRA, CIHR and CATCH Cohort aiming at validating cost effectiveness and capturing the value of Inflammatory Arthritis Models of Care in Canada.
- The "Development of a Patient-Centred Balanced Scorecard Approach to RA Care"





- The development of the "AAC Osteoarthritis (OA) Information Tool for Patients" to help patients and those at risk of OA have better conversations with their doctors and other healthcare professionals by informing them about the care they can expect to receive.

We published:

- A special issue in <u>the Spring 2018 edition of The Canadian Rheumatology Association Journal (CRAJ)</u>, highlighting our research in the innovative and implementable Models of Care (MoC).

We were acknowledged in:

- The Journal of Rheumatology November issue (Volume 45: No. 11), in the article, "Feasibility of Measurement and Adherence to System Performance Measures for Rheumatoid Arthritis in 5 Models of Care," authored by Barber, et al. discussing the development of 6 system-level performance measures to assess whether an MOC is effective in improving access to care and early treatment of inflammatory arthritis.

We also:

- conducted a **member/stakeholder survey** to help inform member's perspectives on future direction and focus of AAC. A total of 35 responses were received, 83% came from AAC member organizations and 17% from individual respondents.

In addition:

Our 3rd Research Award Program was a huge success this year. We received 52 applications! The recipients
of the 8 award categories were announced at the AAC 2018 Annual Meeting Special Awards Ceremony.

Finally:

- We concluded our year with a successful Annual Meeting held at the Sheraton Centre Toronto Hotel, where members gathered together to celebrate AAC's successes and to plan for the organization's future.

Arthritis Alliance of Canada 2018 Research Awards Program

On Wednesday, November 21st, the Arthritis Alliance of Canada (AAC) recognized <u>recipients of the AAC 2018 Research Awards program</u> at the AAC Annual Meeting Gala Dinner, at the Sheraton Centre Toronto Hotel, Ontario.

This year's award categories reflected the following AAC research priorities:

- 1) Promoting increased funding for arthritis research;
- Building capacity in arthritis research and innovation (e.g. increase in the number of trainees, involvement of patients in arthritis research, partnerships and linkages);
- 3) Facilitating and supporting initiatives that harmonize and strengthen research infrastructure and enhance networking to foster collaborations (e.g. optimizing research use of databases, creating new platforms and research infrastructure) and partnership;
- 4) Promoting knowledge translation and exchange (KTE) as effective KTE is critical to ensure that research;
- 5) findings are implemented and lead to improved health outcomes (e.g. involve stakeholders in a) KT cocreation, b) co-interpretation, c) support with dissemination and evaluation where appropriate).
- 6) Supporting and facilitating patient participation/engagement in arthritis research.

Eight awards were given out to recognize contributions to arthritis research in Canada to:

Arthritis Society Trainee Workshop

In November, we hosted our annual Arthritis Society Trainee Workshop in Toronto, sponsored in part by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research Institute of Musculoskeletal Health and Arthritis (CIHR-IMHA). This workshop gave all Arthritis Society–funded trainees (i.e. PhD students and postdoctoral fellows) an opportunity to learn skills to set them up for success in arthritis research. This year's theme was "A glimpse of arthritis research in Canada for future investigators: from the lab bench to beyond." Participants learned about how to launch successful research careers, how to engage patients in knowledge translation, and how to craft a winning elevator pitch, before participating in an engaging poster competition.

CANADIAN SPONDYLITIS ASSOCIATION

Information Session on Ankylosing Spondylitis

The Canadian Spondylitis Association held an information session on Ankylosing Spondylitis November 13th to a full house of over 150 people. Rheumatologists, Dr. Inman and Dr. Haroon, presented on the disease, current treatment options and what's on the horizon. We also included Dr. Susan Barlett who spoke about mental health and chronic illness. Dr. John Flannery shared very interesting insights on managing pain and Laura Passalent talked about the importance of exercise as a treatment for helping manage AS. The forum was recorded and can be viewed on-line at www.spondylitis.ca . Expanding our forums to include these two common complications is a focus the CSA has to educate our community on the common complications and impact on their disease.

Participation in University of Toronto IPE Certification Program

Participating in the University of Toronto IPE Certification program, the CSA tasked a group of medical students from various disciplines to research and present back how we can educate and access the indigenous populations in Canada which will help inform our strategy.

The CANRAD Network

The CANRAD Network team includes a variety of decision makers, epidemiologists, clinicians and researchers interested in the use of administrative data for rheumatic disease research. We held a CANRAD Network Meeting during the 2018 CRA Annual Scientific Meeting & AHPA Annual Meeting in Vancouver, BC and we look forward to hosting our 2019 CANRAD Meeting during the CRA meeting in Montreal! McGill University Health Centre



Interesting research projects are underway at the Research Institute of the McGill University Health Centre (RI MUHC), led by rheumatologist Dr. Evelyne Vinet. To improve strategies for health professionals counselling pregnant women with rheumatic disease, her

team is conducting a focus group study assessing the clinical and psychosocial needs, barriers, and facilitators to pregnancy counselling in women with RA and SLE. The first abstract for this study was presented at the 2018 ACR, and an abstract was submitted to the 2019 CRA. She is also building the Lupus prEGnAnCY (LEGACY) cohort, a

large, multi-centre, international prospective cohort of SLE pregnancies, to evaluate adverse pregnancy outcomes, their predictors, and potential preventive therapies. A Canadian Initiative for Outcomes Research in Arthritis (CIORA) funded randomized controlled trial is underway assessing an educational tool for improving preeclampsia knowledge in pregnant women with SLE. Our Lupus Clinic celebrated 40 years of research this fall! CAnadian Network for Advanced Interdisciplinary Methods (CAN-AIM)

The CAnadian Network for Advanced Interdisciplinary Methods for comparative effectiveness research (CAN-AIM) objective is to respond to key knowledge gaps regarding drug safety and effectiveness by answering queries which arise from Health Canada and other regulatory parties. We are currently working with several enhanced cohorts, including PiMS, CATCH, CanHepC and GENESIS-PRAXY, as well as responding to a number of queries



from Health Canada. Our team has collaborated with DSECT's webinar series; we encourage you to participate in the very informative sessions.
